Introduction and Acknowledgements

Since before anyone here thought about a Landscape Partnership, and certainly well before any staff were engaged to deliver one, individuals from a range of organisations met, discussed related issues, decided on strategies and delivered good environmental, cultural heritage, leisure and health initiatives across the place that we are now calling Sheffield Lakeland.

At some point during those conversations the 'germ idea' of formalising working together was hatched, the Heritage Lottery Fund offered the catalyst through the Landscape Partnerships programme and a steering group came together to deliver a Landscape Conservation Action Plan (LCAP).
