Our Partnership

This chapter outlines the approach to governance, partnership working, terms of reference and delivery arrangements for the Sheffield Lakeland Landscape Partnership. The steering group has agreed and signed a partnership agreement (Appendix 1). Those partners, steering group members and otherwise, responsible for delivering projects with Heritage Lottery Fund, (HLF), support are required to sign an accompanying delivery agreement confirming their commitment to meet HLF guidelines.


