## **Risk Assessment Method Statement**

Stoneface Creative is an established organisation founded by a Stonemason and artist, Andrew Vickers, and his son, Tom. They use their private woodland, which is located near Stannington, Sheffield, to exhibit their art work and sculptures, which are all located along a woodland trail. They are generally closed to the public, but can be visited by prior arrangement, or on one of their regular Open Weekends, where members of the public are invited to wander around their woodland paths. Landscape Connections often attends the events to run activities during open weekends, and to engage members of the public in what we do there. At the September event, this will include making small clay sculptures from pre-prepared balls of clay, and creating journey sticks from pre-cut sticks, string and foraged items. The clay sculptures and journey sticks will require SRWT Outdoor learning staff to prepare and brief participants on how to use them safely. Participants will then be asked to find a place in the wood to do this in a self-led manner. Landscape Connections (and associated staff and activities) will be positioned on the grass just beyond the small lake. Being a large, open area, this will better enable people to maintain distance. Members of the public will be reminded by SRWT staff, and by clear signage, that social distancing is to be adhered to, and to wait away from the area if there are already 6 people gathered.

The event itself is organised and set-up by Stoneface Creative, and is an open event from 11am-4.30pm on both days. No pre-booking is required to attend.

Stoneface Creative have a C-19 secure procedure in place which the activity leader at SRWT is aware of, the activities outlined in this RA are facilitated within the confines of this C-19 secure procedure.
