2019-20 has been another exciting year for Sheffield and Rotherham Wildlife Trust as we work towards our vision - to see a Living Landscape - an amazing, green landscape for the wildlife and people of Sheffield and Rotherham – which is understood, enjoyed and cared for by local people and organisations.

Our National lottery Heritage funded project, 'Data for Nature', drew to a close after completing a variety of volunteer led surveys across our sites giving us a better understanding of the wildlife and habitats on our nature reserves. Following on from the success of this project we have secured funding and launched a new project, 'More Data for Nature', aimed at understanding biodiversity trends across a landscape scale.

We also made great strides in our campaigning work this year, launching the Working Draft Street Tree Strategy, celebrating a win in the fight to save ancient woodland Smithy Wood and challenging the South Yorkshire Police to improve their approach to wildlife crime.

We connected over 9,300 people to nature through our community projects; Outdoor Learning, Wild at Heart and Natural Neighbours, a number which seems to grow and grow every year.

Like many others at the end of this period we were impacted by COVID-19. Since the Covid-19 pandemic and lockdown began we have continued to care for our network of nature reserves that provide such vital respite for users, boosting health and wellbeing and providing much needed access to nature. We of course had to pause many of our plans but our staff leapt to the challenge and we adapted our services and projects to ensure we stayed connected to you and you stayed connected to nature during this time.

We launched an online engagement campaign called Nature Adventures which included interesting videos, blogs and activities to keep you supported and entertained. Our Natural Neighbours and Wild at Heart teams worked hard to reach those who may not have access to the internet by making up activity packs to post to the participants they usually engage with though their community projects.

Finally, I would like to say thank you to our members, volunteers, funders and partners - without your ongoing support none of this would have been possible.

hectares of land manged for wildlife.

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April 2019

Volunteers carried out surveys across a variety of sites as part of the **Data for Nature** project which helped us to understand the wildlife and habitats on our nature reserves in more detail.

July 2019



Working towards **our vision**

Creating a Network for Nature

As a result of our work, there will be a more resilient network for nature. This network will support a greater diversity and abundance of wildlife, habitats and natural spaces.

The **Brighter Sunnybank project** was completed. The urban nature reserve now has improved access and infrastructure. We opened up the woodland area to increase the security of the site and enhanced the wildflower meadows.



A major river restoration scheme was completed at the **Woodhouse Washlands** nature reserve on the River Rother, with installation of three berms in the artificially straightened river channel to create more diversity in the flow and improve conditions for fish breeding. Earth bunds were also installed on the floodplain to create standing water for over-wintering waders and three new great crested newt ponds were dug.



To improve the nature reserve for breeding migrant woodland birds, such as redstart, spotted flycatcher and pied flycatcher, a woodland restoration project was undertaken at **Blacka Moor**. Invasive rhododendron

and sycamore were removed, in particular along the watercourses, and targeted thinning created glades and a more open woodland structure. Halo thinning was undertaken around 90 of the largest trees on the reserve, to create space for these future veteran trees to thrive. Two new woodland ponds were created to provide extra feeding opportunities and specially designed bird boxes were installed to provide breeding sites.

Forestry restoration work was carried out to ancient woodland at **Greno Woods nature reserve** as part of a long-term management plan which aims to bring about a gradual shift towards the re-establishment of native broadleaf to the north and east of the site, providing a range of benefits to wildlife, people and the landscape. **www.wildsheffield.com/reserves/greno-woods**



The Data for Nature project continued to collect data across our nature reserves, which helped the Trust understand the wildlife and habitats on our nature reserves in more detail. Baseline data was collected by volunteers for woodland condition and meadow assessment at 3 nature reserves, bird surveys at 4 nature reserves and Ancient Woodland Indicators at Moss Valley. Other monitoring includes: vegetation at Hammonds field, dragonflies at Kilnhurst and Woodhouse, bog at Blacka, skylark at Woodhouse and waders at Woodhouse. Also in the autumn, fungi at Blacka and Carr House Meadows and harvest mice at Woodhouse. Funding was secured to continue this project and More Data for Nature was launched.

We are working towards increasing biodiversity through natural flood risk management, woodland management and partnership working. We made really good progress engaging farmers in the **Sheffield Lakeland** area with onsite natural flood risk management improvements that also benefit wildlife. Additionally through the SLLP Woodland Heart Project we worked with Sheffield City Council to convert 7Ha of conifer plantation to broadleaved woodland, including some ancient woodland restoration.

Connecting people with nature

As a result of our work, more local people will understand, enjoy, value and be inspired by nature and wildlife in their area, regularly visiting wildlife sites and green spaces for leisure, interest, exercise, health and wellbeing.

Over the summer holidays (2019) the **Outdoor Learning and Natural Neighbours** teams

worked alongside a group of 11-15 year old Roma boys, in Eastwood Village, Rotherham, to redevelop the playground at their community centre. Empowered by the sense of responsibility the boys who come from a group considered to struggle in mainstream education, focused on the task, remained motivated throughout, worked hard and delivered what was

expected of them.



Hands-on farm visit experiences delivered at Cliffe House Farm, home of **Our Cow Molly**, connected children from urban areas with the countryside, food production and wildlife. Our farm family days at Our Cow Molly were extremely popular with over 1500 children taking part during just one weekend.



A highlight in the Natural Neighbours' calendar is Eastwood Funfest, a neighbourhood celebration that takes place on the Natural Neighbours project site, Eldon Road Recreation Ground and is the result of a community effort led by Sheffield and Rotherham Wildlife Trust's Natural Neighbours Project and the Clifton Learning Partnership. For summer 2019 the theme was 'Carnival', and the day showcased local musical talent, costume and mask making, cooking, play and craft activities, with a carnival procession led by Sheffield Samba band







There was a fantastic response to our recruitment drive for our Working for Nature trainee scheme. Despite appalling weather we had great attendance on the John Muir Discovery Award, a week long course giving a taster as to what the Working for Nature traineeship is all about. Every day it rained but this did not dampen the spirits of the attendees. Following this we recruited two new 1-year trainees especially focussing on people less likely to have the opportunity to work in the environmental sector.



We had nearly 900 volunteer attendances through our **Volunteer Work Days**, supporting monitoring programmes, Land Management team and our ecology as part of the Sheffield Lakeland Landscape Partnership. This included setting up a new Barn Owl group to support the conservation and installation of barn owl boxes in the Lakeland area. To say a big THANK YOU to our volunteers we organised a Volunteer Raptor Day which included a talk about raptors and how to ID them, an explanation and show of raptor boxes, pellet dissection and a guided walk around Wyming Brook.

Partnership Working Strategy




We took on the role of Independent Chair for the Sheffield Partnership Street Tree Strategy Group with the aim of developing a shared strategy that AMEY, Sheffield City Council and local community groups could agree to. After a series of discussions and workshops, and with the help of guest experts, the Working Draft Street Tree Strategy was published in March 2020 and has since been adopted by Sheffield City Council.

Thank you to everyone who has donated to our Badger Appeal. We have raised £14,315 to date. In the summer of 2019 we met with the Lord Mayor of Sheffield to the Trust to discuss our Badger Appeal for a vaccination programme and provided information about the threat of a badger cull for our area and Living Landscape Development Manager Dr Nicky Rivers shadowed Derbyshire Wildlife Trust's Badger Vaccination Project to learn how the work is carried out on the ground in case we need to implement such a project in our area.

Trust network and through Greener UK to secure a strong Environment Act for the country when we leave Europe. This has developed in to the Wildlife Trusts' national 'Wilder Future' campaign. As part of this campaign;

We forwarded over 300 messages

from people in Sheffield and Rotherham to their MPs, asking them to support the new Environment Bill and call for stronger legislation.

Met with Louise Haigh, MP for Sheffield Heeley to raise the importance of including Nature Recovery Networks in the Environment Bill.

Sent a group of staff and volunteers to London to attend The Time Is Now, a mass lobby event at Parliament. Many attendees spoke to their MPs to call for a strong Environment Act, and we featured in live TV coverage of the event on Sky News.

Gave a speech about the need for action on the ecological crisis at the Sheffield Youth 4 Climate Strike in Sheffield City Centre.

Organised a nature and environment themed hustings at The University of Sheffield for main party General Election candidates in the Sheffield Central constituency.

Held a workshop on environmental campaigning at the Catholic Diocese of Hallam Schools' Environment Day

Save Smithy Wood CAMPAIGN HIGHLIGHTS

This year we celebrated a big win in the Save Smithy Wood campaign. Here is an insight into the journey so far. www.wildsheffield.com/campaign/smithy-wood

We began the fight to protect Smithy Wood, an ancient woodland, from being destroyed by a proposed new motorway service area (MSA).

Worked in partnership with other organisations opposing the scheme, supported the Cowley Resident's Action Group in their application to designate Smithy Wood as a Village Green and continued to update and engage the public, our members, local woodland experts and the local MP through the media and public events.

Responded to a further planning consultation in autumn 2015 and continued to engage with the process through to Planning Committee and beyond, as required.

Liaised with local wildlife and planning experts from across the city to co-ordinate and submit a detailed objection to the planning application.

Held a public rally outside Sheffield Town Hall with over 300 attendees.

June Reminded the public about the beauty of the ancient woodland with a press release about the carpet of bluebells at the site – an indicator species of ancient woodland – and reiterated our opposition to the planning application.

November An alternative MSA application at Junction 33 in Rotherham was approved by Rotherham Council's Planning Committee.

November We held an event 'Irreplaceable; An Evening of Trees' in partnership with author Julian Hoffman and Sheffield Trees Action Group (STAG) which included a talk about Smithy Wood from Living Landscape Development Manager Dr Nicky Rivers.

January We celebrated the news that MSA Extra withdrew their application to develop a major motorway service area on Smithy Wood.

What's next?

But this is not the end.

For this wood to be saved for local people and wildlife we now ask St Pauls as land owners to work with us so that we can secure this woodland for future generations to enjoy.

Looking ahead and beyond...

COVID-19 had a major impact on our work going into 20/21. However we are beginning to open up our activities, such as conservation volunteering and trialling engagement offers with our schools and wider community.

Therefore, at this point in time, we still plan to work to our programme of activity as originally planned but recognise this may be reduced.

 Achieve our maintenance, biodiversity and access objectives across our nature


> Map an evidence based Nature Recovery Network for Sheffield

- > Support the delivery of the Sheffield Partnership Sheffield Street Tree Working Strategy.


